The British writer Benjamin Zephaniah is known for his poetry as well as novels, plays, and other works. His poetry is called "dub poetry," which means that is performed—the words are recited over the beat of reggae music.

His parents were Jamaican and even as a child he enjoyed the reggae music and poetry of Jamaica. He started writing poetry when he was very young.

His first book of children's poetry was called *Talking Turkeys* and was published in 1994. Since then he has written much more for children. In 1999 he also started writing novels for teenagers. His first novel, *Face*, was

about racial discrimination. His other novels include *Refugee Boy* (2001) and *Teacher's Dead* (2007).

In addition to his poetry and fiction Zephaniah wrote plays for television, radio, and stage. He also performed in television shows and movies.

Benjamin Zephaniah sadly passed away on 7th December 2023.

We will celebrate his life by continuing to read and enjoy his books in school.
